Monday September 27, 2010

Course

Live Fire Active Shooter - Mike Herbes

This course is designed to teach methodology for training patrol officers to respond to active shooter situations through live fire. We will discuss and address progression of training to get an end result of live firing the agencies active shooter formation in scenario based training.

Student Requirements: Duty gear with duty pistol and 2 spare magazines, rifle with sling, eye & ear protection, body armor optional. 150 rounds of handgun ammo, 100 rounds of rifle ammo

Survival Shooting is Speed Shooting - Michael Boyd

The focus of this block of training will be the role of rapid target acquisition in many law enforcement incidents.

Student Requirements: Weapon & holster, 3 or more magazines with holsters (or speed loader holders), 200 rounds of ammo, comfortable clothing, note taking materials

Urban Patrol Rifle - Clint Smith

This course includes the base skills of safe handling, admin and action loading, malfunction clearance, deployment, tactics, use of cover, concealment, shooting with movement and manipulation skills.

Student Requirements: 300-350 rounds of ammunition, generally for magazine fed iron sighted rifles but other rifle types accepted. Low powered or dot type optics permitted but it is recommended that backup iron sights be available somewhere on the rifle. Elbow and knee pads suggested.

Developing Reactive Shooting Skills - Michael Gibson & Travis Gibson

The one goal in developing this course is to help refine the shooting student's reactive shooting ability. Secondly to help them shoot faster and teach faster shooting. The reason an officer needs faster, more accurate shots is obvious. The sooner a threat is neutralized, the sooner all lead stops flying through the air which reduces the possibility of injury to the officers and bystanders proportionately.

Student Requirements: 3 (minimum) handgun magazines and 400 rounds of handgun ammo.

Urban Patrol Rifle - Clint Smith

This course includes the base skills of safe handling, admin and action loading, malfunction

clearance, deployment, tactics, use of cover, concealment, shooting with movement and manipulation skills.

Student Requirements: 300-350 rounds of ammunition, generally for magazine fed iron sighted rifles but other rifle types accepted. Low powered or dot type optics permitted but it is recommended that backup iron sights be available somewhere on the rifle. Elbow and knee pads suggested.

Course

Glock Armorer Course – Dennis Tueller

Student Requirements: None

Superior Firearms Training on a Budget Part 1 – Mike Lehner

This seminar will examine how the many challenges of modern firearms training can be met, even by departments with extremely tight budgets. You will experience firsthand how simple portable targets can be used by any department on any range to elevate practical firearms training to dramatic new ideas.

Student Requirements: Duty gear, duty weapon at least 3 magazines and 500 rounds of ammo

Combat Pistol Shooting & Coaching – Mike Herbes

This course is designed to explain why we are currently teaching the techniques we teach. Building a foundation for combat shooting based on the applied physics of the weapon, and the physiology and psychology of the shooter. The class will cover basic through advanced skills, drills and exercises that will help the firearms instructor teach new or problem shooters. Techniques for enhancing the instructors program to teach shooting in a combat / survival situation and coaching the students through is the primary objective.

Student Requirements: Duty gear with duty pistol and 2 spare magazines, body armor optional, 350 rounds of handgun ammo

Defensive Urban Rifle – John Farnam

Handguns will be carried by all students during all the instruction, so we can practice longarm-handgun transition. You'll need twenty rounds of handgun ammunition. We will accept most medium and heavy, auto loading, military rifles in 7.62x51 (308), 7.62x63 (30.06) 7.62x39 (30/Soviet) 5.45x39 (22/Soviet), M1 Carbine, and 5.56x45 (223) caliber. Pistol cartridge firing carbines, such as the Beretta CX4 are also acceptable. We will not accept rimfire rifles. Bolt guns, lever actions, and other low capacity sporting rifles are not recommended. Slings are mandatory, as we will be running a hot range. High magnification, high profile, close eye relief scopes are not suitable for our purposes. Good iron sights are recommended. Low power low

profile forward mounted optics is acceptable and is also recommended. The best rifle to bring is a military autoloader.

Student Requirements: 200 rounds ammunition (and see above)

Instructing the Female Officers in Firearms Training – Vicki Farnam

This course is lecture/discussion and range exercises. A combination of discussion and lecture will help instructors identify the problems female officers encounter and why those exist. Instructors will participate in range exercises that will illustrate the problems encountered by female officers followed by exercises that will suggest techniques to correct the problems. Live fire drills will utilize both paper and steel targets.

Student Requirements:

Gunfighting One Hand Shooting Techniques – Dennis Carroll

This objective of this course is to indoctrinate police officers in the dynamics of a gunfight and provide a valuable skill set to build on.

Student Requirements: Holster, ammo pouch, two extra reloading devices, 50 rounds range ammo, note taking materials.

Optional Night Courses

Low Light Handgun Combative – George T. Williams

To provide the police officer or agent as well as those working in a plain-clothes capacity with the necessary skills to effectively fight and prevail in a low light / no light lighting environment while employing their firearms.

Student Requirements: DOT Style reflective vest, at least one handheld flashlight, additional..but not required weapon mounted light permitted, 150 rounds of ammunition. Additional officers attending RTC may observe but will not be able to participate in the live fire drills.

Low Light Positional Shooting Techniques for Handgun & Rifle – Michael Hatoor

This course is multi-faceted In terms of reviewing positional shooting techniques for the duty handgun, patrol rifle and transitions between the two in low light.

Student Requirements: Eye and ear protections, baseball style hat, all by-standers must wear eye and ear protection.

Developing Low Light Combat Speed & Accuracy – Todd Fletcher

The first step in establishing combat speed and accuracy is developing the skills necessary to draw and present the weapon in a manner that maximizes economy of motion. Because of the short duration and timeframe of law enforcement gunfights, officers must be trained to draw and present their weapons in a condensed period of time.

Student Requirements:

100 rounds of handgun ammunition, duty pistol, duty gear, two spare magazines, flashlight, pistol mounted flashlight if carried, ear and eye protection, billed cap. Concealable body armor is recommended but not required

This seminar will examine how the many challenges of modern firearms training can be met, even by departments with extremely tight budgets. Student Requirements: Duty gear, duty weapon at least 3 magazines and 500 rounds of ammo

Practical Fundamentals – Bruce Gray

BUG Art Back Up Gun Strategies for the LE Professional – Mike Boyle

In a lethal encounter, ready access to a backup gun can mean the difference between life and death. Officers may fall victim to a disarm, and even the best handguns can suffer a catastrophic failure or otherwise be disabled. Going to Plan "B", and continuing to fight, gives the officer the means to prevail against overwhelming odds. Many officers routinely carry a backup, but few train under realistic conditions.

Student Requirements: Duty hand gun with 25 rounds of ammo, backup hand gun with 150 rounds of ammo. Corporate sponsor Sturm, Ruger & Co. Inc will be providing a limited number of .38 special revolvers for this class.

Instructing & Coaching Basic Handgun Marksmanship – Bill Garland

Course objectives, placing quick, fight-stopping hits on the threat is the core gun fighting skill. The firearms instructor is continually challenged by the constant need to develop this skill in new officers and improve it in veteran officers. This class will provide the law enforcement firearms instructor with concepts, information and teaching strategies critical for coaching combat handgun marksmanship at all skill levels. The instructor will understand the need to continually connect the ability to hit with the ability to think move and fight.

Student Requirements: Duty handgun with three magazines, 250 rounds, holster and magazine pouch, inexpensive monocular or binoculars

Airsoft Based Force on Force Class – Thomas Bengel

Through the medium of force on force utilizing Airsoft technology, providing the unit instructor or individual officer with the synthetic experience of an actual “gunfight” where theories about what works and does not work can be trained or proven before requiring those skills in an actual event.

Student Requirements: Long sleeved shirts and groin protection
